




Camp Summary:

Due to high demand, SVSFE decided to offer two sport fishing camps in 2017 at the Wellman Lake United Church Camp. From August $14^{\rm th}$ to $17^{\rm th}$ and August $17^{\rm th}$ to $20^{\rm th}$, groups of 24 and 25 campers ages 9-14 attended the youth outdoor highlight event of the summer.

Camp activities are designed to incorporate values of outdoor survival and all things fishing... 2017 was definitely the year of lots of straight-up angling! Beautiful weather for seven days ensured most time was spent on the water. Other activities included fish species ID and behavior, fishing basics, boat safety, casting contest, fire building, canoe tipping, geocaching, plant ID and wilderness exploring.







Special guest and pro angler Don Lamont attended both camps with expert angling tips and advice. Topics included sustainable angling, catch and release tips, how-to's on tying knots and lure presentation for targeting species at different times of the year.

Park Patrol also presented at camp with vital information on angler responsibility and Manitoba Angler Guide regulations. Park Patrol has attended every camp since 2011 and their presence helps open up dialoque and understanding proper angling practices.
