




2019 Online Angler Survey Summary:

SVSFE understands the importance of qualitative data and incorporating angler's insight into potential management objectives. In 2015, a survey questionnaire was created and conducted in-person by a summer student(through a Service Canada grant) as well as an online submission option. The following years, 2016-2019 were continued with completely online submissions. There was a noticeable spike in entries when posts and reminders were released online. 2019 brought a whopping 78 surveys strictly from boosts and promotion on Facebook. Online submissions were made available on the SVSFE website throughout the winter of 2018 continuing until the end of October 2019. Partnerships made with FLIPPR and Roblin Economic Development increased the study area into the Parkland region to provide extended insight and feedback from anglers. Promotion through social media was the main contributor to receiving entries. The following is a review from surveys received.

Angler demographic/Area use specifics:

Seventy-eight angler surveys were completed in 2019 and of these, 82% of the anglers resided in Manitoba, followed by Saskatchewan (13%), the United States (4%) and Alberta (1%) (Figure 1). Figure 2 represents the towns/cities in which anglers resided. The concentration of anglers is within a 425 km radius. Not pictured is an Alberta resident from Redwood Meadows (940 km). The USA residents not pictured range from Billings, MT(840 km), Arcadia, WI(1,085 km) and Columbia, MI(1,565 km).

Of the 64 Manitoba residents, surveys received from each area are as follows: Swan Valley(25), Winnipeg(12), Brandon(8), Dauphin (6), Plumas (2), Roblin (1), Glenboro (1), Notre Dame de Lourdes(1), Bredenbury (1), Zhoda (1), Niverville (1), Birtle (1), Saint Claude (1), Oakbank (1), Newdale (1), Lorette (1), Flin Flon (1) and Ashville (1). From the Saskatchewan side: Yorkton (2), Regina (2), Saskatoon (2), Springside (1) and Melville (1). Received from Alberta: Redwood Meadows(1). Lastly, the USA: Billings, MT (1), Arcadia, WI(1), and Columbia, MI(1). Of these anglers, the majority possessed regular fishing licenses (60%), followed by conservation licenses (32%), youth licenses (4%), senior licenses (3%) and other (1%).



Angler demographic/Area use specifics cont'd:

First topic on the survey asks anglers which area they usually fish. Options were the Duck Mountains, the Porcupine Mountains, the Southwest Parkland, River systems and Other. Most frequented was the Duck Mountains followed by the Southwest Parkland, Porcupine Mountains, River Systems and Other.


Areas Fished in the Parkland



Anglers who visit the Duck Mountains exclusively do so an average of 31 times a year(range 1-200). Anglers exclusively visiting the Southwest Parkland do so an average of 5 times/year(range 1-15). Porcupine exclusive anglers visit an average of 31 times a year(range 12-187).

When it comes to accommodations anglers utilize campgrounds the most, followed by day trips and other accommodations not listed. Twelve out of 78 anglers were cabin owners. Angling was identified as the primary reason for visiting the Parkland by 92% of surveys while the remaining 8% were visiting as campers and hunters.


Accomodations Utilized While in the Parkland



Angler demographic/Area use specifics cont'd:

Anglers declared the Duck Mountains as the favourite fishing destination of the Parklands, closely followed by Twin Lakes.

Favourite Fishery



On average, anglers are spending \$300 per fishing trip and \$3,000 annually. Angler demographic plays a big role in how much is spent per trip and year(see Table 1). Anglers are fishing (not just in the Parkland) an average 64 days/year(range 5-300)



General Fishing Inquiries:

Generally, anglers are retaining 16% of their catch in the Parkland. Interestingly, retain/release ratios differed amongst area exclusive anglers. Duck Mountain exclusive anglers retain approximately 22% of their catches and Porcupine Mountain exclusive anglers retain approximately 36% of their catch. Parkland exclusive anglers are only retaining 3%. Anglers are targeting stocked waterbodies the most, closely followed by natural recruiting lakes and then river/streams. The top sought after fish species was rainbow trout, closely followed by walleye.

Top Sought After Species




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General Fishing Inquiries cont'd:

Anglers had multiple fishing expectations while in the area. Most common were spending time outdoors and catching big/master angler fish.

Fishing Expectations




Anglers utilize different fishing tactics besides regular rod/reel in the Parkland such as ice fishing and fly fishing. Patrons are going ice fishing (49%) and fly fishing (12%) and both ice/fly fishing (33%). Other activities listed were minnow trapping, dip netting, bow fishing and spear fishing. Regarding enforcement presence, 71% of anglers have been checked at some point while visiting the Parkland while 29% have never been checked. Checks per year average at 3 and range from 1-25.

Fish Enhancement Awareness:

Approximately 96% of individuals were previously aware of the Fish and Wildlife Enhancement Fund and 97% supported those initiatives. Ninety-two percent of individuals were previously aware of SVSFE and of those, 97% supported their initiatives. Individuals were asked if they would consider contributing to the FWEF stamp even if they were exempt (ie. Senior) from purchasing a license and 92% were in favor.






Projects and Activities:

The most common project/activity supported by anglers was to continue stocking fish. This has been the most supported project every year since this survey was initiated in 2015. This shows a strong awareness of the significant role our hatcheries play in recreational fishing, further signifying the importance of efficient and practical stocking practices. Besides stocking, anglers are also very supportive of assessments on lake/fish health and improve angling experiences/access.

Projects/Activities Anglers Would Like To See More Of



Anglers were given the opportunity to specify activities they'd like done or issues they face. A full list of suggestions can be viewed in the appendix, but a few examples included:

- ✓ More trout stream development
- ✓ Start stocking Splake again and consistent plan to maintain regular stocking into future , esp to Laurie Lake and other lakes with splake.
- ✓ Crack down on anglers who abuse the lakes and go over limits
- \checkmark Create a slot size for East Blue lake walleye. Stop the spear fishing at East Blue lake.
- ✓ Develop a Black Crappie fishery and possibly another smallmouth fishery around the Parklands. Stock more Splake.
- \checkmark I would like to see new backcountry lakes developed. Too many lake are too easy to get to and are getting over pressured
- \checkmark West blue lake is tough to access and could be packed with a gravel road if the water drops a foot
- ✓ Splake/lake trout identification signs on Laurie lake(a lot of 26 plus inch lakers are taken out of there) Tighter lake trout regulations for Childs, East Blue, Laurie. Stocking in Gull and East Blue will take alot of pressure off of Laurie and Beautiful, kind of like how it was in the mid 90s
- √ have catch and release only for brook trout on West Blue Lake. Preferably catch
 and release all trout(excluding rainbows) in the duck mountains
- \checkmark The parklands is a world class trout fishery. Ensure that perch blooms do not get out of hand like Persse Lake.
- ✓ Has SVSFE ever considered local amateur fishing tournaments? Maybe one on ice and one on open water per year, feature different lakes each year? Could be a fun fundraiser with good prizes, and gives ability to promote specific fisheries?


On a lighter note, some complimentary quotes towards efforts to date:

In addition to the general questionnaire, anglers have access to a daily catch form. Entries were received from all areas of the Parkland. Individual surveys should be reviewed in the appendix as each fishery is unique. Average fishing quality for the Parkland was 5, with ten being the highest quality. Average hours spent fishing was 4 and average catch was 1 fish/hour with a 89% release rate.

Conclusion:

In summary, out of 78 surveys completed in 2019, 82% of anglers were from Manitoba, 60% possessed a regular license and declared the Duck Mountains as the most frequented area visited. Between all Parkland areas, anglers are visiting on average 29 times/year and spending \$3000 annually. When asked, in general, how often anglers fished, the response equated to 64 times/year (equal to 5 days out of a month). When relating the minimum cost stated per fishing trip (\$10), this would equate to a minimum investment of \$640/angler/year into Manitoba's recreational angling. The majority of anglers are staying in campgrounds when visiting closely followed daily visits to the area. The Duck Mountains was declared as the most favourite fishing destination. Anglers are looking to spend time outdoors and catch big/master angler fish when heading to the Parkland. Rainbow trout was once again the top sought after species for the 4^{th} year in a row. Fisheries enhancement initiatives were highly supported both on provincial and local levels. In addition, there was a high support towards contributing to the FWEF stamp even if anglers were exempt from purchasing a license. This initiative would be similar to other provinces where all anglers must purchase a stamp and contribute to a "fisheries initiative fund". The most common practices anglers would like completed is the continuation of fish stocking, assessments on lake/fish health and the development of new fisheries.





- Honestly think whitefish lake gets netted to much for the size of the lake.


